3 COURSES OF STUDY:

My Work To Do, https://www.myworktodo.com/ This is a learning circle format for 90 minutes a week for 5 weeks. Developed by Suzanne Edwards-Acton of the Los Angeles Episcopal Diocese, this program brings together, online, a wide range of people from across all locations and backgrounds who each week view content together, reflect and share. It's a brave space to learn.

<u>Sacred Ground</u>, <u>https://www.episcopalchurch.org/sacred-ground/</u> This is a study program of The Episcopal Church using film and readings with small group discussions. Over a 10-part series, groups learn about America's racism focusing on Indigenous, Black, Latino and Asian/Pacific histories as they intersect with European American histories.

White Awake, https://whiteawake.org/about/ conducts courses online during the year focusing on white supremacy particularly how to change the legacy of this supremacy that we've inherited. Through readings and video, leaders guide participants to connect with their own stories and affirm different stories seeking social change for the benefit of all.
